“Now on the first day you shall take for yourselves the foliage of beautiful trees, palm branches and boughs of leafy trees and willows of the brook, and you shall rejoice before the LORD your God for seven days. You shall thus celebrate it as a feast to the LORD for seven days in the year. It shall be a perpetual statute throughout your generations; you shall celebrate it in the seventh month. You shall live in booths for seven days; all the native-born in Israel shall live in booths, so that your generations may know that I had the sons of Israel live in booths when I brought them out from the land of Egypt. I am the LORD your God.” So Moses declared to the sons of Israel the appointed times of the LORD.

## Main Points

- ***The Feast of Tabernacles or Sukkot, 2020 begins at sunset on Friday, October 2, 2020 and ends at nightfall on Friday, 2020.***
- Tabernacle in English is Sukkah in Hebrew.
- Even if we lost everything in life, as long as we still have God, we will be okay.
- Vayikra is the Hebrew word for the Book of Leviticus.
- Tishrei is the seventh month on God's Holy calendar.
- Tabernacle (the main Tabernacle) in English is Mishkan in Hebrew.

## Discussion Questions

1. What does a sukkah represent to the Jewish people? What is the application to us today?
2. Can Gentiles participate in this festival? Does it put one back under the law to observe a festival like this? Why or why not?
3. What are some take-aways for you personally from the celebration of Sukkot?
4. How does this simplified, back-to-nature type of living make you feel, and especially in thinking of the people of Israel doing it in the wilderness for 40 years?
5. Rabbi spoke of this holy day taking the Jewish nation back to their early days of being led by a cloud by day and fire by night and trusting God for everything. Why does this festival bring rejoicing and thankfulness? Write about this in connection to your own story.
