• Song of Solomon 4:16-5:2

Awake, O north wind, and come, wind of the South; make my garden breathe out fragrance, let its spices be wafted abroad. May my beloved come into his garden and eat its choice fruits!

I have come into my garden, my sister, my bride; I have gathered my myrrh along with my balsam. I have eaten my honeycomb and my honey; I have drunk my wine and my milk. Eat, friends; drink and imbibe deeply, O lovers. I was asleep but my heart was awake. A voice My beloved was knocking: Open to me, my sister, my darling, my dove, my perfect one. For my head is drenched with dew. My locks with the damp of the night.

4. Did you pray the prayer Rabbi prayed about making your garden fully His? Write your reflections on this prayer and your heart's desire.
